
Featured Artist Martha Morrison: Martha uses a variety of media, and likes 3-dimensional work the best. Her pottery is mostly functional, and she enjoys a variety of techniques: wheel throwing, slab work, molds, and sculpture. She often includes nature in her pieces. In addition to pottery, she carves wood and soft stone.

Featured Artist Judith Kornett: Judith graduated from the University of Maryland with a BFA and an MFA in printmaking. She spent the next 40 years teaching art in Annapolis, Maryland. While teaching Judith continued to be a productive artist, producing limited edition prints, fine art photography, and colored pencil

and graphite drawings. Since 2008, Kornett has concentrated on ceramic sculpture, using both hand built and thrown forms to create her work. Through this work she explores form imagery and surface, with an emphasis on pattern, texture, and color



Judith Kornett: The last ten years have seen an astounding evolution in my sculpture. My first series, created in 2008, depicted mythological figures, both classical and invented. These sculptures were both electric and wood-fired. They were mostly humorous in nature, often embellished with colorful feathers, beads and wires. While attractive and fanciful, they did not feed my artistic soul.

My next series was started in 2012. It was a reaction to the everincreasing levels of violence both in the United States and abroad. These figures had such titles as "Crawling for Safety" or "Do Guns Have a Heart?"". Throughout this series the viewer could discern the consistent presence of personal icons such as shoes, black hearts, and guns, all representing elements of the anti-violence theme.

Currently I am working on a series of sculptures devoted to the expression of deeply felt pain, sorrow and heartache. Creating this body of work has been an intense and soul-searching experience, one that I believe will continue for some time to come





Featured Artist Martha Morrison

Martha: My interests have moved toward 3 dimensional sculpture recently. Course work taken at the Frederick Clay Studio has shaped my work and expression of subjects important to me. I also continue to make my favorite functional items, but I am enjoying my exploration of sculpture, both realistic and abstract.





CLAY WORKSHOPS!



"VisArts Majolica"

As Linda Arbuckle, a master of Majolica explains, the name "majolica" comes from the Spanish port of Majorca where the Italians imported their ware. When the French imported it from Faenza, they called it "Faience". Later the Dutch perfected the technique and called their ware "Delftware" for the city that specialized in its creation. Traditionally, red earthenware clay is covered with a tin-based opaque white glaze and colorants are painted on the raw glazed surface. We shall create "VisArts Majolica"

We will use traditional Majolica techniques using VisArts Cone 6 opaque white glazes with underglaze decoration on pots made from VisArts Cone 6 clay. Designs are painted directly on the dry glaze surface maintaining their line quality when fired and melted into the surface. Please bring your good brushes and design ideas and lots of pots.

Cane and Reed Handles

Installment #1

We recently took an extended vacation to Italy, the Western Mediterranean, and Greek Isles. While on this trip we were able to visit some wonderful spots and find some great and interesting pottery venues. I wanted to share this experience with our fellow Guild members.

One of the first places where we found a little local pottery shop was Piccioli, Italy. This was a quaint little walled city that contained some wonderful shops and restaurants.

It was here I came across the first pottery shop run by one of the local artists. We had a very nice conversation and I purchased one of her pieces — a simple but elegant tea cup with strainer and lid. Even the glaze was simple, clean and only added to the appearance of the pieces.







While we covered a lot of territory (19 ports in 23 days) it wasn't until we got to the Sicily that I found another gallery that had a very unique teapot. My curiosity was definitely peaked when I saw the teapot had no lid. I went into the gallery and asked if I could take pictures of the artist's work (to which they very accommodating). As you can see, from the pictures below, the teapot has a hole and funnel in the bottom that allows you to fill it from the bottom. The funnel extends up the inside to some point above the spout which allows you to pour without spilling out the bottom.
